—A committee has been appointed in Allegany County to argue interest in the National Dairy Exposition, which is to be held at the fair grounds at Syracuse, October 5-13.

—At a committee meeting consisting of the Noble Grands of each of the lodges in the county, held at Wellsville, Wednesday, it was voted to hold the third annual F. O. O. F. picnic at Belmont, on Labor Day, Sept. 3rd.

—LeClair Wheaton, 23 years old, whose home is in Canaseraga, but who has been working in Rochester, is held by federal agents charged with violating the liquor laws. He admitted bringing three cases of gin with him from Rochester, which he was selling in Hornell. He is held on \$1,000 bail to await the action of the federal grand jury.

RURAL TELEPHONES

Rural telephone owners connecting with the Bell centrals at Wellsville, Angelica and other Allegany County towns are up in arms over what they call exorbitant rates.

The farmers built their own lines and bought and installed their own telephone instruments. After they had been operating satisfactorily for some time the Federal Telephone Co. offered to connect them to its exchanges and switch them onto its lines in the villages when they desired to make a call, for the sum of \$3.00 a year. Subsequently, the Bell Company took over the Federal holdings and very shortly raised the rate to \$6.00, a 100 per cent increase.

Now, after a few years, comes another 100 per cent. jump, and the farmer wonders how high the limit will be if he just saws wood and makes no complaint.

The matter has been taken to the Public Service Commission, with Attorney D. D. Dixon as their counsel.

OLEAN MOTORIST KILLS BIG DEER

OLEAN, N. Y., July 21. —Henry C. Ludden, Olean motorist, returning from Pennsylvania, reported killing a doe with his automobile in Potter county at midnight.

The deer leaped from a bank to the middle of the concrete highway fifteen feet, and landed directly in front of the automobile. The collision threw the driver violently against the steering wheel, but he escaped with bruises.

He drove the carcass to Coudersport, where it was dressed. The venison was turned over to the Coudersport Hospital and will be served to the patients.
