## KEEPING WATCH

HORNELL, July 24.—Denying that any official of that village had requested State Troopers to be sent there for the purpose of arresting reckless and speeding motorists,

prominent Arkport people said this morning that it must be broken up, nevertheless.

Justice W. B. Page of Arkport, quoted as saying that the troopers had been asked to come to Arkport, emphatically denied that this was the case. He declared that troopers would haunt state roads in this section until generally reckless, mad drivers had become docile or else had begun to use some sense in driving on state roads near Arkport.
