Miss Thelma Glover of Friendship and I. Frederick Dick of Richburg were married July 12th.

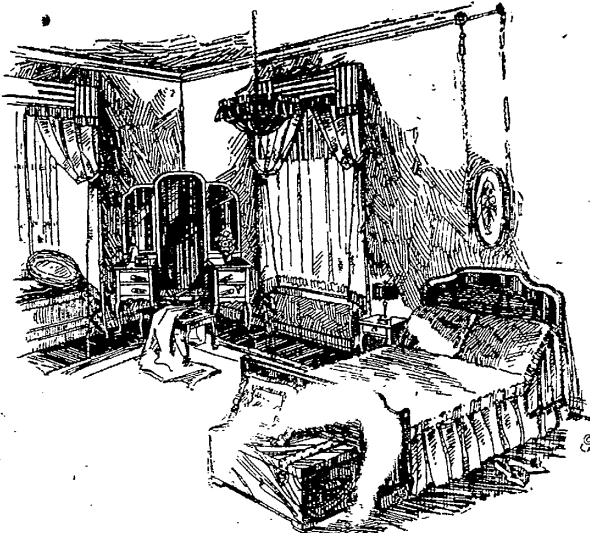

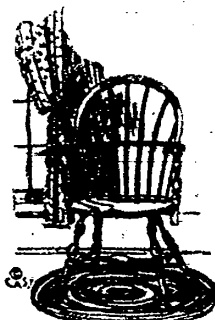
