The fact is apparent that the only sure and reasonable method by which we may hope to reduce taxes below the present high schedule is to reduce the number of officials holding down political jobs that return fat pay envelopes for every meagre—if any—service rendered. It is too much to expect a reduction in taxation forthcoming from such officials when it would mean reducing themselves out of lucrative salaries and out of the great political arena that creates such an over-abundance of official posi-ations simply to keep the lolitical fences in repair and to insure that the path to such political power is kept well lubricated. It is high time that the common public apply a little grease on the skids that lead to the way out.

Any ordinary business man knows that to be successful and keep adding to his account on the profit side of his ledger he must be careful and keep the overhead expense down to the lowest possible minimum. He does not put an excess number of clerks on his payroll and keep them there the year round unless he has absolute need of their services. Wherever it is possible to dispense with hired help he does not hesitate in applying the pruning knife to this department of his overhead.

Make an honest comparison between private and governmental business today, and you will cease to wonder why taxes keep mounting the millage scale. Pick out some ordinary business where no doubt the proprietor is handling every department himself from janitor up to the easy chair at the desk. He works hard, and often puts in long hours, but is not overworked, for he speeds up today when business is brisk and relaxes a little when the lull comes. He could use a helper an hour or two several days each week, but he doesn't put a steady employe on his payroll to increase his overhead and eat up

Elect this same man to county office and he would be given an assistant or two to help him take care of a set of books no more extensive than the set he handled in his own business.
