### FARM BUSINESS STUDIED

Tour to Observe Principles of Good Farm Management

On Tuesday, August 21st, Professor I. F. Hall of the Farm Management Department from the State College of Agriculture, will assist the Farm Bureau in conducting a tour to inspect Farm Management principles as practiced on several types of farms in this county. The tour will take in a combination of poultry and dairy farms, sheep and dairy, dairy alone, bean, potatoes and sheep and a general, large, well balanced diversified farm business with dairying, poultry, sheep raising, pure bred cattle and fruit to make up the farm income.

This tour offers a splendid opportunity to study the three big factors of efficient farm business, size, diversity, and economic production.

The schedule of the tour is as follows:

10 A. M. Assemble at the farm of A. L. Middaugh, two miles east of Friendship on the State Road.  
11 A. M. George Sheffield, two miles east of Angelica.  
12 to 1 P. M. Basket Lunch.  
1 to 2 P. M. J. McMahon, State Road near Birdsall.  
2 to 3 P. M. F. D. Bacon, just east of Canaseraga.  
3 to 5 P. M. I. D. Karr, Almond village.

## THE TWELVE HOUR FARMING DAY MUST GO

### Twelve Hour Day Produces A Surplus Which Keeps Down Prices.

Now that the twelve-hour day is doomed in the steel industry, the equally arduous farm work day may be trimmed down to eight hours. L. L. Cosline, writing in the American Agriculturist, maintains that this is practical, but that the remedy for present conditions, admitted to be bad, lies within the farm family itself, now often as badly exploited as any sweat shop city family.

Mr. Cosline summarizes the reasons as follows: the desire to get ahead, the feeling that the work must be done, and an inherited belief that it's a sin to be idle.

"One of the principal reasons," says Mr. Cosline, "for long hours, is the desire to get ahead. A young farmer said to me 'I can see a lot of ways to make money, if I could only get time to do the work.' Perhaps he didn't realize that it was merely another way of saying that if he could do three men's work, he could get fair returns for one man.

Every young man who starts on a farm wants to get ahead, and to him, one of the surest ways of doing it is to put in long hours. It does mean that he gets ahead faster than his neighbor who puts in fewer hours, but counting in all the men who are doing the same as he, it means that they are competing against each other to see who has the most endurance to produce a surplus which brings down the price for everyone."

The results of the long hours are felt by every member of the family. "It results in less time for recreation and improvement, greater difficulty in maintaining the same standard of education for farm boys and girls, as obtained in cities, and the final draining away into the cities of the most intelligent and progressive young people."

"We have heard instances in so-called sweat shops where the whole family would earn only a bare living by working for long hours, but there are farms where the conditions are nearly as bad. It is no doubt better for farm boys and girls to be busy rather than idle, but when the time comes that they must leave school at an early age, in order to work, the condition is no longer a healthy one."

Can shorter hours be made practical on a farm? Mr. Cosline says yes, though he admits that farmers will laugh at his suggestion of two shifts.

"At this time of year, when the work extends over about sixteen hours a day, two shifts would work splendidly," he says.

"I can almost hear the farmers laughing at this statement, but so long as farmers are willing to work long hours to feed the rest of the population with cheap food, you aren't going to hear any long and loud objections from them. A few things can be done, but they need concerted action to make them effective."

"Of course there would be a big howl by consumers if any concerted action should be taken to bring this about, but farmers have no cause to feel they have a duty to perform in feeding the public without profit."
