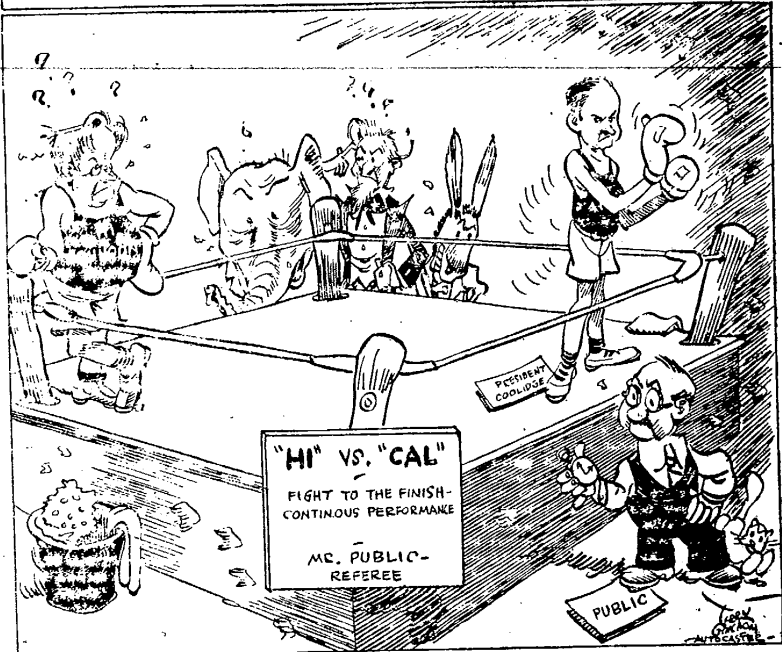
## Rude Rural Rhymes
