One Hundred Dollars a Year Toward College Education Given the Following:

Following are the names of those high school pupils in Allegany County who have won University scholarships. There are issued to the pupils of each county five times as many scholarships as there are assembly districts in the county; the number appointed being taken from the top of the list of those who receive college entrance diplomas. In case any one of these winners should decline the scholarship, it is immediately offered to the next eligible candidate on the county list.

The holder of one of these scholarships will be entitled to \$100.00 a year for the four years of his college course while attending any college in the State of New York approved of by the Regents for the purpose.
