A resolution asking congress to grant a pension of \$72 to every veteran of the Civil War will be considered at the fifty-seventh annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, to be held at Milwaukee, Wis., beginning September 2. Widows of veterans would be given pensions of \$50 a month, the resolution also provides.
