Hospitals and Colleges Remembered By Mary Clark Thompson of Can-andiagua.

New York, Aug. 16.—Charitable and educational institutions will receive \$1,965,000 under the will of Mrs. Frederick Ferris Thompson, of New York and Canandaigua, which was filed for probate here today. The estate is estimated at \$10,000,000.

The largest single charitable bequest, \$400,000, was made to the Frederick Ferris Thompson Hoispital at Canandaigua. Bequests of \$300.000 each were made to Vassar College, Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., and Teachers College and the Women's Hospital of New York. Clark Manor House at Canandaigua receives \$200,000.

The residue of the estate approximately \$8,000,000, goes to Mrs. Thompson's nephews, Emory W. Clark, president of the First National Bank of Detroit, Mich., and Clark Williams of New York, for life. In the event of Mr. Clarks' death without surviving children, his half of the residue will go to Williams College, Vassar College and Teachers College. If Mr. Williams dies childless, his share goes to the Zoological Society of New York, Women's Hospital and New York Public Library.
