


SUPPOSE it's because I've driven around so much in the last fifteen years that I've seen about twice as many accidents as the average motorist. Can't begin to remember them all, but I know a lot were connected with passing trolleys.

One special reason for this lies in the different rules and regulations that prevail in different localities. In some places you may not pass a standing trolley at all, and there the pedestrian cross-ing the street should be perfectly safe from automobiles, so long as the trolley remains standing. In other places motors may pass a standing trolley "with due care" or "not less than" six or eight feet away; in these cases both driver and pedestrian ought to watch their going mighty carefully.

My best advice is to keep up to date on your own local rules about passing trolleys, etc., and follow them scrupulously. When you are away from home, and may not know all the local provisions, abide by the strictest rules for safety that you do know.
