well were of any avail. Until the spirit of a people is conquered the nation is not conquered. A trip thru Germany at this time will not fail to convince the traveler that the spirit of the German people is not one iota less enthusiastic today than it was previous to the World War. The Germans are now biding time, waiting until they are ready for the opportunity to strike again, and rest assured strike they will, no matter whether it will be 20, 30, or 40 years hence.

Despite the fact that she is not keeping her agreement in regard to reparation, Germany is today the richest nation in Europe. She is also the busiest nation in Europe. She is spending loads and loads of money in building up her industries. It is said she is also spending stupendous sums in Russia for large factories for the manufacture of ammunition and guns and aeroplanes, all with expert German advice and supervision.

The old country, I mean Europe, with its hatreds, mistrust, conspiracies, economic chaos, cruelties and coercion is a lively place. Where the world will drift to with it all is hard to imagine. Nations are like individuals. Some one has said that we come into the world with a cry and go out with a sigh. From the beginning to the end it is mostly strife and trouble, so it is with nations generally. Will this quarrelling ever end? Will we ever reach the ideal of human brotherhood, of mutual trust and help?

But let me get back to the train. After a stop of about an hour it started again and inside of half an hour stopped again. Again soldiers came into the compartment and examined everything.

"Isn't this supposed to be a sleeping car?" I asked the French soldier. "Yes," he replied, "There is a lot of trouble going on here, and it is not likely you will be able to get any sleep until you get out in the morning. This train carries supplies to the troops and for that reason it has to make frequent stops."

There has been a good deal of sabotage here on the part of the Germans who do everything in their power to interfere with the proper management of the railroads and mines by the French. Only a few days ago the Germans across the border started a train of an engine and a freight car with no one on board toward the French zone. The train went at a wild rate for 20 miles when at full speed it ran into the depot, demolishing the structure and killing several. Bombs with alarm-clock like devices attached are planted in places where the most damage may be done. These bombs are disguised in various ways, put in places where discovery is not easy and may be adjusted to explode at any desired time.

Frankfort, Germany, 30 miles away, would not be reached until six o'clock in the morning. Time passed slowly. I sat up all night. The contents of my grips—shirts, undergarments, collars, socks, books, a pair of shoes, a folding umbrella, two suits of clothes, medical instruments, my shaving outfit together with more or less than 20 odds and ends were piled indiscriminately at one end of the seats, there to await the next examiners. I had determined not to pack them any more until Frankfort had been reached. The weather was damp and chilly. The night was pitch dark. Outside nothing could be seen except the occasional bonfire of the bivouacked soldiers.
