Voters Will Decide at Polls Election Day-for State's Unfortunates.

We refer to the proposed bond sue of fifty thousand dollars for making the state institutions safe and adequate for the care of the state's unfortunate and dependent vards the voters of the gtate will be assured that probably no public exenditure in the history of the state has been more carfully safeguarded norder to insure its being used to the very best advantage for the express purposes for which it is so urgently needed.

Notwithstanding the wide publi-

press purposes for which it is so urgently needed.

Notwithstanding the wide publicity which the bond issue has received since it was recommended by the governor in a special message to the legislature and passed by a practically unamimous vote of both houses, it is not fully understood that after the bond issue is authorized not one cent of the proceeds can be expended by the State Hospital Commission, the State Commission for Mental Defectives, or any of the other agencies of the state having charge of the institutions affected, until the necessary appropriations have been made in the usual way by vote of the state legislature. The approval of the bond issue act simply gives the legislature authority to vote the needed appropriations under the restrictions imposed.
