—Dr. Robert Fuller, county veterinarian, and Dr. Cady, representing the Federal department of agriculture, have tested about 9,000 head of Allegany county cattle in the three months beginning July 1, and have found about five per cent of reactors among them.

—Charles Snally of Belmont was seriously injured Friday when a New York Central train crashed into his automobile at Schenectady, Melvin Northrup of Schenectady was instantly killed and Raymond Silver of that city and Mr. Snally are in the hospital in a critical condition.

—W. E. Densmore, of Fulmer Valley had his arm broken Wednesday while returning from Whitesville. As he alighted from his wagon to adjust a spoke on the wheel, his horses jumped and the force threw Mr. Densmore to the ground the heavy wheel passing over and breaking the bones in his arm.

—Mrs. Wm. Welch living in the town of Jasper, was killed and her husband seriously injured Monday evening when the buggy in which they were riding was struck by an automobile and demolished. Mrs. Welch was thrown to the cement road and her skull fractured. Mr. Welch had two ribs broken and was badly bruised. The dead woman was 43 years old and leaves two sons.

—John Meineke, hardware merchant in Belfast, indicted by the grand jury for horse whipping Lillian Wood, his 19 year old niece and ward, a school teacher, last June, was sentenced by Judge Ackerman to one year imprisonment in Monroe County penitentiary and to pay \$500 fine. The public feel the sentence was altogether too mild.

—The parties who stole the Willys Knight sedan from the garage of W. N. Pettit in Cuba were located at Burlington Ontario last week. Three men and a woman, professionals, were implicated in the theft. The outfit car has been returned to its owner at Cuba and was found in excellent condition in spite of the fact that it had been driven 3100 miles.

—Stephen S. Owen of Tulsa, formerly a resident of Richburg and well known by many readers of the News is credited with opening a new oil field in Marshall County, Texas. The new development is located 120 miles west of Ranger, near Colorado City. Eight wells have been completed with an out-put of 1200 barrels a day. Mr. Owen and his associates have 50,000 acres surrounding the wells under lease. It is claimed they have turned down an offer in excess of \$1,500,000 for the wells and leases.

—The continued drought in this locality was broken Tuesday night by a steady cold rain which has continued most of the time since. Farmers who have their potatoes all harvested during the dry weather are congratulating themselves.
