Mr. Trandall, Chairman of the Supervisor Committee, spoke of the satisfactory relationship of the Bureau with the supervisors. Mr. F. L. Uter of Friendship spoke of the value of the work and the co-operation between both the Dairymen's League und the Grange to the Farm Bur-

The Farm Bureau Manager out-ined the plan for organization and levelopment of the community committee and program for the coming year and emphasized for the coming year, stating that a letter was being sent to every member and coperator thruout the county, giving a list of the main projects being carried on and asking each person to indicate the lines of work in which he is interested or which he believes are of value to his community.
