FARM BUREAU CHAIRMEN GATHER AT BELMONT TO MAKE PLANS FOR 1924

Farm Bureau Community Chairmen from twenty-three communities of the county met with the directors for supper in Belmont the past week to learn of the plans of organization and development for the coming year.

Mr. J. Coryell, State Leader of Farm Bureaus, outlined the history and development of Farm Bureau work from its accidental start in 1903, and explained the fundamental principles of the organization and functioning of the Bureaus in New York State at this time, emphasizing that the value of the organization thru the county, the community and the individual farmers, depends almost entirely upon the committee in each community developing local Farm Bureau programs.

Mr. A. F. Randolph of Alfred, President of the Bureau, acted as chairman of the meeting and spoke for the development and importance of the association to agricultural interests of the county since they started the work in 1913. Mr. Randolph, Chairman of the Supervisor Committee, spoke of the satisfactory relationship of the Bureau with the supervisors. Mr. F. L. Utter of Friendship spoke of the value of the work and the co-operation between both the Dairymen's League and the Grange to the Farm Bureau.

The Farm Bureau Manager outlined the plan for organization and development of the community committee and program for the coming year and emphasized for the coming year, stating that a letter was being sent to every member and co-operator thruout the county, giving a list of the main projects being carried on and asking each person to indicate the lines of work in which he is interested or which he believes are of value to his community. These will be grouped by communities and community committees will have these as suggestions for their programs of work.

Professor Wingate of Alfred University added inspiration to the meeting by leading in the singing. Rev. Hayden of Friendship closed the meeting with a very inspirational address on the privilege that a man has in making his community a better place in which to live.
