BELINDA ORCUTT HARTMUM

Belinda Orcutt Hartmum was born October 31, 1889, at Bradford, N. Y., daughter of the late Julia A. Ward and Lorenzo Orcutt, and died Monday afternoon, October 29th, 1923, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Edith Milligan, on Greenwood Street.

Her girlhood days were passed in Savona, N. Y. and for some time prior to her marriage, September 11, 1872 to John S. Hartmum, when she came to Greenwood to reside, her time was occupied as a school teacher. Three children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Hartmum, two daughters, Mrs. Elizabeth Osmin, of Rexville, N. Y., and Mrs. Edith Milligan, of his village; one son, William W., who died at the age of six years. The death of her husband occurred February 4th, 1909. Since that time she has made her home with her daughter.

Mrs. Hartmum was a member of the Methodist Church with which she united in early life. She was a woman well known in this locality, where she had a large circle of friends. A lover of nature her great delight was in the culture of flowers and plants with which she had exceptional success. Altho in failing health, despite her age of eighty-four years, she had been active until two weeks prior to her death, and had been able to enjoy a long visit the past summer with friends and relatives in different parts of the state.

Beside her daughters she is survived by ten grand-children and two great-grand-children, a half-brother, A. L. Orcutt, of Lyndhurst, N. Y., and several nephews and nieces.

Funeral services were conducted from the M. E. Church, by the pastor, Wednesday afternoon, and interment made at Greenwood, N. Y.
