This is how John Wesley put it and the position deserves attention from all who would know why the religion of Christ is found enshrined in Scripture in the best available form:

The Bible must be the invention of good men or angels, bad men or devils, or of God.

(1) It could not be the invention of good men or angels, for they neither would nor could make a book and tell lies all the time they were writing it, saying, "Thus saith the Lord," when it was their own invention.

(2) It would not be the invention of bad men or devils, for they would not make a book which commands all duty, forbids all sins, and condemns their own souls to hell to all eternity.

(3) Therefore, draw the conclusion that the Bible must be given Divine Inspiration.

These are the two great, vital and indispensable principles of Christianity: the Bible and Christ. Every intellectual proposition, every aspect of belief, every phase of Christian philosophy, every practical demand, must, to be truly Christian, square with these two, or it is not Christianity, whatever else it may possess of Christian ideas.
