DOMESTIC CLOVER SEED 37,000,000 POUNDS SHORT

A severe shortage of domestic seed for next spring's planting is reported by seed experts of the G. L. F. Exchange. At the Toledo market, the clover seed center of America, only 2728 bags of clover seed have been received as compared with 14,243 bags at this time last year a difference of approximately 28,000 bushels on one market. The North America crop is 37,000,000 pounds short.

Large shipments of foreign grown clover seed have been sent into this country to replace domestic seed. Last week 1100 bags of European seed arrived in New York City. Experts declare that the European seed is not adapted to New York conditions and is not so productive as domestic grown seed. This fact has been proven conclusively, they state, at the New York State college of agriculture.

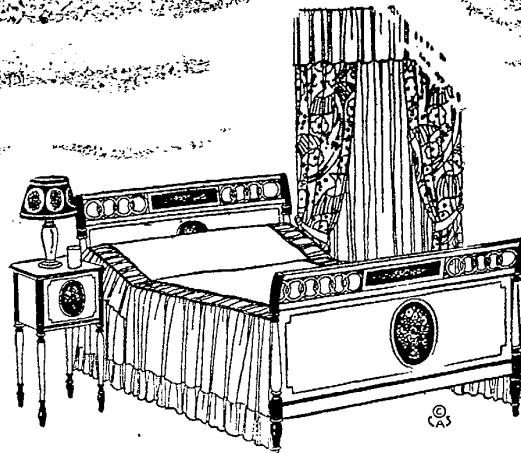
