Fruits and Vegetables

Potato markets steady. New York round whites closed at \$1.65-1.80 sacked and bulk per 100 pounds, \$1.35 f.o.b. Northern sacked round whites \$1.35-1.50 eastern markets, \$1.10-1.15 sacked and bulk in Chicago. Minnesota and North Dakota red river Ohio \$1-1.05 sacked per 100 pounds in Kansas City. Cabbage markets unsettled. New York Danish type sold at \$15-20 bulk per ton in New York and Phila., \$20-25 other eastern cities, \$13-17 f.o.b. Wisconsin Danish cabbage \$12-14 in Chicago, \$10-12 f.o.b. Onion markets nearly steady. New York and midwestern yellow varieties, medium to large sizes ranged \$2.50-3.10 sacked, per 100 pounds. Connecticut Valley yellow Globes, medium sizes, \$2.50-2.70 f.o.b. Apple markets about steady. Eastern Baldwins \$4-4.50 per barrel in New York and Phila. York Imperials \$3-3.75 eastern city markets. Michigan Jonathans and northern Spys \$5.50-6 per bbl. in Chicago. Northwestern fancy Delicious \$2.85-3.16 in Chicago.

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices declined 10c-40c for the week, closing at \$7.50 for the top and \$6.50-7 for bulk. Medium and good beef steers 25c lower to 15c higher at \$7.90-11.50, butcher cows and heifers 10c lower to 10c higher at \$3-10.75; fat lambs 75c lower at \$10.25-12.50; feeding lambs 50c lower at \$11-12.50; yearlings 50c off at \$7.75-10.25 and fat ewes steady at \$4-6.75. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending Nov. 19 were: Cattle and calves 146,008; hogs 16,398; sheep 130,364. In eastern wholesale fresh meat markets beef and mutton firm to \$1 higher, lamb \$2 lower to \$1 higher and pork lions weak to \$2 lower. Nov. 19 prices good grade meats: Beef \$15-17; veal \$12-17; lamb \$22-27; mutton \$15-17; light pork lions \$13-16; heavy lions \$10-14.50.

Grain

Wheat market continues weak. Increasing stocks and continued light demand depressing factors. Corn market lower as receipts increase. Good demand for spot grain of good quality. Oat market steady but

prices slightly lower. No. 1 dark timothy Boston \$29.50, New York \$31.50; Phila. \$28.50; Cincinnati \$24; Chicago \$27; St. Louis \$23.50. No. 2 hard winter Chicago \$1.20, No. 2 hard winter St. Louis \$1.05; Kansas City \$1.04-1.17. No. 2 hard winter St. Louis \$1.10-1.12. No. 2 yellow corn St. Louis 95c; Chicago 96c-1.01. Hay

Market continues generally firm. Higher grades scarce and in good demand. Poorer grades selling at wide discounts in eastern markets. Mild weather causing light southern demand. Alfalfa firm for good quality. Quoted Nov. 17: No. 1

Feed

Markets extremely quiet. Eastern markets considerably easier than western shipping markets. Discounts continue to be offered in order to place transit cars. Cottonseed meal prices steady, demand light, offerings increasing.

Dairy Products

Butter markets firm during the week especially at the close. Withdrawals from storage heavy. Imports increasing and of greater im-

portance at relatively higher price levels prevailing. Wholesale prices on 92 score today: New York 54c; Chicago 52 1/2c; Boston 51 1/2c. Cheese markets closed the week relatively firm. Demand has been fair and there is apparently confidence in the situation on the part of dealers in distributing markets as well as at country points. Asking prices have been held to more closely with no general tendency to shade prices in order to get business. Wholesale prices at Wisconsin primary Nov. 17: Flats 24c; Twins 23 1/2c; Single Daisies 24 1/2c; Longhorns 24 1/2c; Young Americas 25 1/2c.
