**AUTO ACCIDENT FATAL****TO AGED VETERAN**

Fred C. Carryer Struck While Walking Across Street—Lived Only Few Hours.

Fred C. Carryer, veteran of the Civil War, and a resident of this place on Pennsylvania avenue for a number of years, was struck by an auto driven by Dr. Len Edwards of Greenwood, about four o'clock Wednesday afternoon, and died from his injuries that same evening.

Mr. Carryer had gone to a neighbor's, on the opposite side of the street, to call, and was returning home, walking by the side of the road. Mr. Edwards saw him and sounded his horn to warn Mr. Carryer of his approach. When Mr. Carryer was opposite his home he turned directly across the street right in front of the car. Mr. Edwards swerved his car until both front wheels were off the road but was unable to escape hitting Mr. Carryer. The impact was so great that one light was broken and a dent put in the radiator, while Mr. Carryer suffered two broken hips and one broken leg.

Mr. Carryer was 76 years of age. —Friendship Register.

**SECRETARY HAMILTON****AT ALFRED UNIVERSITY**

Albany, Nov. 26.—James A. Hamilton, Secretary of State, will pay his first visit to Allegany county on Wednesday, December 5, when he will be the guest of honor at Alfred University in connection with the annual Founders' Day exercises. Secretary Hamilton will reach Alfred about ten o'clock in the morning and will remain for several hours before returning to the State Capitol at Albany.
