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KING TUT HAD TUBERCULOSIS

If Tut-Akh-Amen had known 4,200 years ago what we now know about tuberculosis, he might have continued to ride thru the streets of Thebes in that wonderful golden chariot for possibly many more years instead of being an untimely victim of a preventable disease. But tuberculosis is not a respecter of persons. It takes high and low, rich and poor. And how the young King did hate to go, judging by the way he clung to his treasures even in death, in the hope of being reunited with them sometime in another world.

If he had lived today, his doctor would have detected the first symptoms of the disease and ordered his Royal Highness to the simple life—back to nature, rest, a rational diet, medical supervision, away from the fast pace of court life for a few months and back he would come with rosy cheeks and springy step, feeling like a King again.

But then, if they had known as much about tuberculosis 4,200 years ago as we do now, there wouldn't be much, if any, tuberculosis now. This is shown in the remarkable decrease in deaths from tuberculosis in the United States in the past twenty years since the strenuous fight against the dread disease was started by the National Tuberculosis Association. The number of deaths then was over 200,000 every year. It is now less than 100,000—cut more than one-half in twenty years.

One of the greatest contributing factors in bringing this about is the little Christmas Seals which are distributed every year in December, giving every man, woman and child a chance to help fight disease and promote health in their own community.

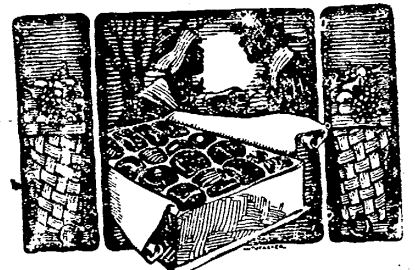
