SUPERVISORS MUST OBEY LAW

neglect to perform any of the duties which are or shall be required of him by law, as a member of the board of supervisors, he shall for every offense forfeit the sum of \$250.00 to the county. For refusal or neglect to perform any other duty required of him by law, he shall for every offense forfeit a like sum to the town.

PENAL CODE—Section 1841
A public officer, or a person holding a public trust or employment, upon whom any duty is reposed by law, who willfully neglects to perform the duty, is guilty of a misdemeanor.
