### ERIE MUST PROTECT

#### RAILROAD CROSSINGS

Albany, Dec. 10.—Because of the heavy vehicular traffic and the physical conditions, the Public Service Commission today directed the Erie Railroad before June 1, 1924 to install at the two grade crossings of the Wellsville-Andover highway crossings of the Erie Railroad, located near Wellsville and Andover, automatic visual signals which will give traffic sufficient notice of the approach of trains. The railroad is to submit to the Commission by February 1, plans showing the type of signals to be installed. They are to be of a type to give travelers adequate notice of train movements.
