Dairy Products

Butter markets closed the week

but steady with an unsettled un-
dertone. Demand sluggish and real
buying interest confined mostly to
top grades. Retail outlets appear
smaller at high prices prevailing.
Production appears to be holding up
remarkably well for the season. All
operators cautious. Imports contin-
ue in moderate quantities. Today
closing wholesale prices on 92 score
outlet: New York 55c; Boston 54c;
Chila. 55c. Cheese markets featur-
ed by further declines during the
week which however failed to bring
about any activity. Demand very
slow and buyers lack interest. Dull
trading expected until the first of
the year. Wholesale prices at Wis-
consin primary markets December
21: Twins 22c; Longhorns 22½c;
Square Prints 22½c.

Hay

Market continues generally dull
with only slight price changes re-
ported. Receipts timothy light but
equal to light pre-holiday demand
in most markets. Quoted December
21, 1923: No. 1 Timothy Boston
\$29.50, New York, \$30, Pittsburgh

\$25.50, Cincinnati \$24.50, Chicago
\$27.50, Minneapolis \$19, St. Louis
\$25.50. No. 1 alfalfa: Kansas City

prairie: Kansas City \$15, Minne-
apolis \$19.50.

Feed

Wheat feeds remain strong in
west but spot feed \$1-2 below of-
fers for shipment. Oil meals firm
but demand of small volume. Corn
feeds dull but prices practically un-
changed.

Grain

Wheat market weak and lower.
Future prices 2-4c lower for week.
Cash grain also lower because of
dull demand. Corn prices slightly
lower. Receipts light but demand
limited. Oats in fair demand but
prices have declined with other

beef steers 40c lower to 25c higher
at \$7.85-11.40; butcher cows and
heifers 25c lower to 25c higher at
\$3.50-11.25; feeder steers steady at
\$4-8; light and medium weight veal
calves steady to 60c lower at \$8.50-
\$10.50. Fat lambs steady to 50c
higher at \$11.25-13; feeding lambs
25c lower at \$10.75-12.25; yearlings
steady at \$8.25-11; fat ewes steady
to 25c higher at \$4.75-7.50. Stock-
er and feeder shipments from 12 im-
portant markets during the week
ending December 14 were: Cattle

sheep 32,367. In eastern wholesale
fresh meat markets beef ranged
from weak to \$1 lower; veal \$1-2;
