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#### THE INDIVIDUAL BUDGETT

DEOPLE who do not cultivate the habit of saving have no legitimate reason to complain because they have nothing. Yet much of the complaining is done by those who make no effort whatever to save. They are never quite satisfied until the dollars in their hands are transferred to some other person's pocket.

As an example, take the case of Mr. Jones, a purely mythical person whom we advance for purposes of il lustration.

Jones has a family. He is brainy and draws a sal ary of, say, \$300 a month. But one essential to success is missing—he is minus the balance wheel which should induce him to save something each week from his earn

He couldn't tell you how his money goes. It simply disappears. He never knows what his household ex penses are, he has no idea how much he spends on cloth ing for himself and family, his benefactors are libera but he is at ease as to the amount, and all of his other expenditures are conducted in the same manner-totally without system. The money comes in regularly each month and goes out as it comes.

Now consider the case of Mr. Smith, another mythi cal gentleman.

He is on a par with Jones in every way, except that he has a balance whee!, and it functions perfectly.

He knows exactly how much he will receive each month, therefore he knows exactly how much he can afford to spend.

Being a married man, also, his first that is for clothing and the monthly household expenses. He carefully estimates the cost of each for the year. In like manner he carefully estimates the cost of all other expenditures for the year, itemizing them as he goes along. Then he strikes a total.

If he finds that his expenditures, as estimated, will consume all of his salary, he revises his list, reducing the estimate where it can be reduced. When he pairs them down to 75 per cent. of his earnings he feels safe—and the family lives within that estimate. Twenty-five per cent. goes into the bank each month.

Smith, you will observe, prepares an annual budge. of expenditures at the beginning of each year. He never touches his savings, and he always has money. He is getting there.

Jones doesn't bother his head about a budget, has no check on his expenses, and has no bank account. He is standing still. ...

Whether one believes the rich should bear the governmental burdens of the poor through the medium of excessive taxation on large fortunes or feels that every man should contribute a pro rata share of his income for the support of the country, the fact remains that men of great wealth have clearly demonstrated their power to block the wheels of industry by removing capital from business enterprises and placing it in non-taxable securities. Also it now appears that in the Mellon plan of taxation, which spells reduction, there appears to be a readiness on the part of the men of millions to change front, put more money into industry, and aid in restoring a greater pros-perity to the country. These are facts, not opinions. Every indication for the new year is bright. There

has been an unprecedented spending power displayed dura ing the holiday buying season which reflects confidence in the future. Merchants, of course, are ordering with great caution, but this bespeaks rather a sound foundation of the business structure, healthier than would be the wholesale ordering of merchandise.

Most impressive of the signs of better times, however, is the universal cheerfulness of the utterances of big business men and financiers, the latter unquestionably enthused over the thought of a possible reduction in their enforced payments to the government. They all look for sound improvement, and every indication is that their belief will be justified unless the congress by some unfortunate stroke

"spills the beans."
