#### OLIVE T. WILLIAMS

Olive Tewel Williams was born March 2, 1876, at Malvern, O. Her girlhood was spent in Dell Roy and Malvern. She was a graduate of the Malvern High School and also a musical graduate of Mt. Union college. She was married to Rev. H. B. Williams, Jan. 21, 1903, at Malvern. She was highly popular in pastorates in Big Flats, N. Y., Gallipolis, O., and at Andover, N. Y., where the family lived for ten years. Thomas Hamilton was born at Big Flats, N. Y., Jan. 18, 1908.

Mrs. Williams was a highly accomplished musician and rendered great service in the churches of Mr. Williams' pastorates.

She had been in failing health for two years, but did not become serious until the spring of 1923.

Throughout her illness she was the recipient of many tokens of esteem and friendship from many friends, and her passing was grieved by her many acquaintances.

For four months she had been tenderly cared for at the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Williams of Freeport.

On Jan. 1, her sufferings ended. The funeral service was held Jan. 2 at the family home, Revs. Conrad and Guiler being the officiating ministers. She was buried in Greenmont Cemetery, Freeport Press.

In the ten years pastorate of Rev. Williams at the Andover Presbyterian Church, Mrs. Williams endeavored herself to a large circle of friends in her efficient cooperation with her husband in the work of the church and its societies. In the social affairs of the village she was always prominent where her sunny temperament and musical ability were greatly appreciated.

Mrs. Williams was an active member of the Andover Woman's Christian Temperance Union and Anna McArthur Chapter Order Eastern Star.

Her death has brought a deep personal grief to the hearts of many friends in Andover whose sympathy goes out to the bereaved husband and son in their sorrow.
