### 11 STOLEN AUTOS FOUND BY POLICE; 2 AWAIT TRIAL

Police Chief Bailey, aided by Detectives Conroy and McKenzie of Buffalo and Armstrong of Rochester, last evening identified two more automobiles alleged to have been stolen by George Salzman and Clarence Laine, Canisteo men now held in jail at Rochester on charges of grand larceny. This brings the total of cars recovered to eleven. Of this number four have been taken to Rochester and the others are either locked up or are still in the possession of the persons to whom Salzman sold them. They will be surrendered when necessary.

The two additional cars recovered yesterday were a Ford touring car, taken from Ralph Peters of East Rochester last September, and a Chevrolet coupe stolen from Harvey Johnson of No. 382 South Goodwin street, Rochester, on November 25th. Salzman and Laine have conducted a garage in Canisteo for three years and were supposed to be honorable business men.
