Barney Shiner and Lura Slocum passed Sunday with Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Slocum.

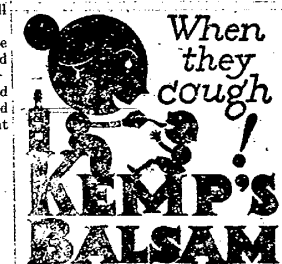
