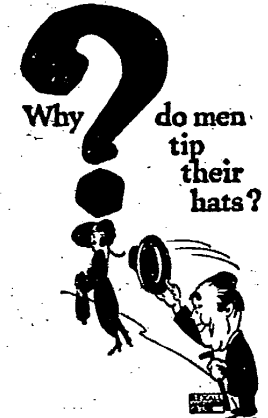
ROMAN DENTISTS CAPPED TEETH CENTURIES AGO

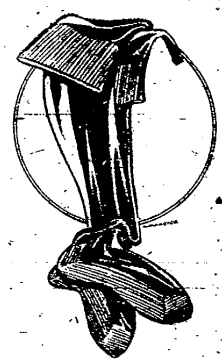
