—Mrs. Polly Green of Alfred Station, widow of the late Harry Green died Sunday morning after an illness of months duration. Mrs. Green was a woman held in high esteem and well known to Andover people where she has been a frequent visitor.

—Mrs. Rose DeFrater of Trapping Brook, was thrown from a buggy Friday night while driving home from Wellsville and seriously injured. An examination revealed that a broken rib had punctured her lung. She was taken to the Jones Memorial hospital.

—Andover pond is frozen solid and the finest skating is being enjoyed. The surface is like glass with no snow to interfere with the sport. Parties from Alfred and neighboring places in company with Andover young people are thoroughly enjoying the sport.

—The Department of Farms and Markets announces that an examination will be held for those desiring to obtain licenses to test milk by the Babcock method, at the State School of Agriculture, Alfred University, Alfred, N. Y., on Friday, February 1, from 9 a. m. to 2:30 p. m.

—Many cars driving down Chestnut Street have performed acrobatic stunts upon the hill by skidding on the ice which covers the pavement. Wednesday evening a car driven by Kirk Ruger skidded and side wiped one driven by Dr. Comstock of Wellsville. The damage to the cars was slight. Later in the evening a car slid entirely around, bumping over the curb and sidewalk into the yard of the Backus residence.

—Bernice Skinner of Hornell, 18 years old, came near losing her life while watching a basketball game between the high schools of Corning and Hornell, at Hornell. Because of the crowd in attendance, chairs were placed on the floor of the court, during the game two players, running at full speed, crashed into the chair, Miss Skinner's head was thrown back with such force that her neck was dislocated, causing paralysis. The girl was taken to a hospital where surgeons state they expect her to recover.

—At the annual meeting of the Cuba Rod and Gun Club it was voted to join the New York State Fish, Forest and Game League. The secretary was instructed to make application to the state this year for 25,000 calico bass, 25,000 Oswego perch, 25,000 pike perch, 25,000 perch, 200 young pheasants and 750 pheasant eggs.

—John Grames, 68 years of age, a resident of Shinglehouse, P., was found dead at his home Monday morning by neighbors who forced an entrance into the house. Grames was found sitting in a chair, his cap on and his slippers off. It is believed he had been dead three days. His wife was visiting relatives some distance away.

—The Senate confirmed the appointments of 130 New York State postmasters including that of Postmasters George C. Palmer of Cuba; Mabel F. Reynolds, Alfred; Adolph Bluestone, Canasagaga; Julius Fisher, Wellsville. President Coolidge will sign the commissions of these nominees within a few days, and they will each be appointed for a four-year term from the date of their commission.
