### FOURTH STATE TAX CONFERENCE WILL BE HELD IN ALBANY

All of the four thousand supervisors and assessors in the state of New York will be offered an opportunity to express their personal and official views on taxation matters at a tax conference to be held at Albany, February 20 and 21, under the auspices of the State Tax Commission. The conference will be held in Chancellor's Hall, State Education Building, and the first session will convene at 10 A. M. February 20.

Officially the state-wide gathering will be known as the Fourth State Conference of Assessors and Eleventh State Tax Conference. Approximately five thousand invitations have been or will be issued to tax officials and individuals interested in tax matters.

Governor Smith will address the conference. Among other speakers to talk on taxation will be Congressman Ogden L. Mills, president of the New York State Tax Association, Commissioner Graves and Commissioner Merrill, of the State Tax Commission, with an address of welcome by Mayor Hackett, of Albany, and President Gilchrist of the State Tax Commission.

Assessor Walter Downer of Andover is anticipatini participating in this conference.
