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FIVE DAY TRAINING SCHOOL FOR CHURCH SCHOOL WORKERS

Those interested in better Bible School work are to have a splendid opportunity for general and specialized training in the Five Day Training School for Church School Workers which is to be held in Whitesville, Feb. 24-29, under the auspices of the County Bible School Association and the State S. S. Association.

A faculty, consisting of State Supt. Elmer Yelton, Education Supt. Dr. T. Basil, Young People's Division Supt. Fred C. Cartwright of Albany, and Mrs. Guy Sharp of the Buffalo Training School and another children's specialist will be the instructors.

The school offers courses in Religious Psychology and methods of instruction, teaching values of the Bible and Bible School administration. Specialization courses will be given in story telling, home religious instruction, Bible geography and customs, and hand work.

Classes will be held during the afternoon and evening. A nominal registration fee of one dollar for the week, to help meet the necessary expenses will be charged. Further particulars may be had from any pastor or S. S. superintendent, or from the County Superintendent, Rev. Walter L. Greeke, Andover, N. Y., the director of the school.
