Fruits and Vegetables

Potato markets about steady. Eastern round whites sold at \$1.65-\$1.90 sacked per 100 pounds eastern cities; \$1.40-1.45 f.o.b. North. In sacked round whites \$1.20-1.35 in Chicago. Old stock cabbage \$3-\$5 lower in New York and Chicago, nearly steady other markets. Danish type ranged \$27-35 bulk per ton city markets; \$23-28 f.o.b. Florida new stock stronger in New York at \$2 per 1% bushel hamper. Yellow onions generally steady to firm, best stock closing at \$2.25-2.75 sacked per 100 pounds, city markets; dealers asking \$1.90-2.10 f.o.b. for Connecticut Valley stock. Texas spinach \$1.75-2 per bushel basket leading markets, top of \$2.25 in Baltimore. Apple markets fairly steady. New York Baldwins from cold storage sold at \$4-4.50 per barrel. Eastern Stayman Winesaps \$4-4.50, Missouri Jonathans \$5-5.50 in Chicago.

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices advanced 15c-20c for the week, closing at \$14.00 for the top and \$6.95-7.25 for the bulk. Medium and good beef steers 15-25c higher at \$7.90-11; butcher cows and heifers 10c lower to 10c higher at \$3.40-10.75; feeder steers steady at \$4.50-8; light and medium weight veal calves 75c-\$1 lower at \$9.25-12. Fat lambs 50-60c higher at \$12.50-14.60; feeding lambs 25c net higher at \$11.75-13.75; yearlings 25c up at \$9.50-12.50; fat ewes steady to 25c higher at \$5.25-8.75. Stocker and feeder shipments from

12 important markets during the week ending January 25 were: Cattle and calves 50,778; hogs 7,443; sheep 31,911. In eastern wholesale fresh meat markets beef is firm to 50c higher; veal firm to \$2 up; mutton firm to \$1 higher and pork lions \$1 lower to 50c higher. February 4 prices good grade meats: Beef \$12.50-14.60; veal \$18-21; lamb \$21-24; mutton \$16-18; light pork lions \$13-15; heavy lions \$11-13.50.

Hay

Hay prices slightly lower. Supply exceeds demand at practically all markets. Lower grades more difficult to move. Demand for alfalfa at Kansas City less active. Quoted February 2: No. 1 timothy, Boston \$28.50; New York \$29.50; Pittsburgh \$26.50; Cincinnati \$24.00; Chicago \$26.50; Minneapolis and Kansas City \$49. No. 1 alfalfa: New York \$31.00; Memphis \$32.00; Cincinnati \$27.00; Minneapolis \$23.50; Kansas City \$24.50. No. 1 prairie Chicago \$20.00; Minneapolis \$16.00; Kansas City \$14.50.

Feed

Feed prices received further setback. Wheat feeds and oil meals soft corn feeds fairly steady. Stocks of all feeds are rather large and in excess of the demand. The consumptive demand because of mild weather remains apathetic. Production and the movement was fair.

Grain

Wheat markets continues steady advance. Future prices up 3c-4c for the week cash wheat in good local demand by mills. Receipts of smaller volume. Corn markets firm. Higher market prices increasing movement, but restricting demand at

markets. Oats steady demand good. Quoted February 4: No. 2 hard winter wheat Chicago \$1.12-1.13, Kansas City \$1.08-1.21, St. Louis \$1.14-1.14. No. 2 red winter, St. Louis \$1.21-1.22, Kansas City \$1.14-1.15. No. 2 yellow corn Chicago 81c. No. 3 yellow St. Louis 78c-79c, Kansas City 73-74c. No. 1 white oats Chicago 49-49c, St. Louis 49-49c, Kansas City 49-49c.

Dairy Products

Butter markets continue irregular and unsettled. Tons temporarily firm at the close today altho dur-

ing most of the week there was tendency toward weakness and lower prices. Supplies ample and demand barely moderate. Imports available in liberal quantities. Closing prices on 92 score butter: New York 51c; Chicago 49-49c; Philadelphia 51c; Boston 51-51c. Cheese markets barely steady. Wisconsin cheese board declines an average of 1c during the week, but trading quiet and not responding readily to the decline. Severe weather in Wisconsin still affecting production and movement.
