## HUNTERS' RETURNS FROM OLD ALLEGANY COUNTY

The returns on all kinds of game reported on licenses issued in Allegany county follow. The fact that the license was issued in Allegany county does not necessarily indicate that the game was taken in this county:

Cottontail rabbits, 20,957, an increase of 3,626; skunks, 6,277, an increase of 1,209; grey squirrels, 4,802, a decrease of 669; muskrats, 4,288, an increase of 2,280; black squirrels, 2,610, a decrease of 223; grouse 2,209, an increase of 280; woodcock 273, an increase of 13; pheasants, 1,365, an increase of 420; raccons, 1,037, an increase of 312; red foxes, 271, an increase of 46; mink 314, an increase of 146; snowshoe rabbits, 421, a decrease of 70; fox squirrels, 181, an increase of 41; jack rabbits, 20, a decrease of 55; ducks 111, an increase of 9; grey foxes, 23, an increase of 7; golden plover, 0; opossum, 14, an increase of 13; lesser yellowlegs, 0; terns 2, a decrease of 18; bobcats, 0, a decrease of 1; fishers 0, a decrease of 19; bears, 1, a decrease of 1; geese 2, an increase of 2; number of licenses issued, 4,338, an increase of 237.—Belmont Dispatch.

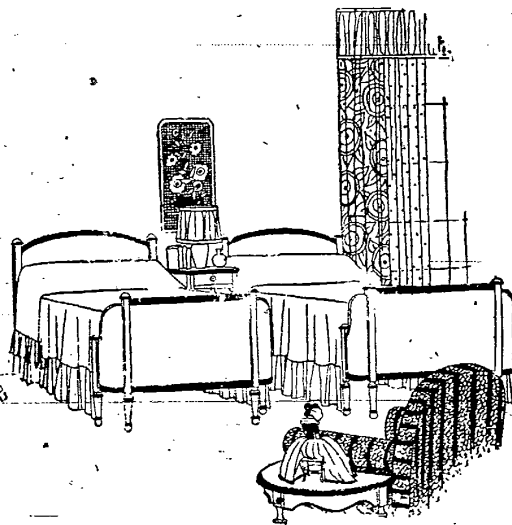

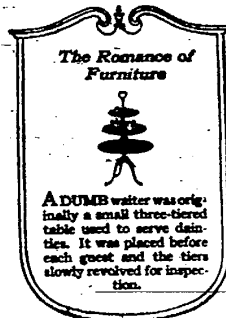

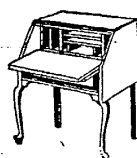

The Romance of Furniture

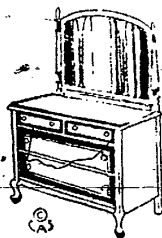
A DUMB waiter was originally a small three-tiered table used to serve dainties. It was placed before each guest and the tiers slowly revolved for inspection.

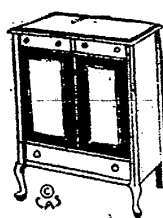
