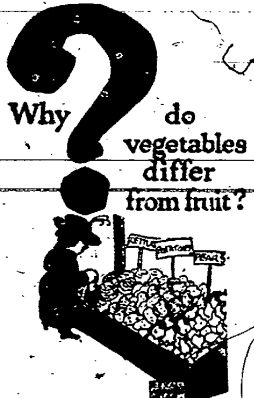

"Be it hereby enacted that: All persons vending milk within the Village of Andover for local consumption must file with the Secretary of the Board of Health on or before June 1st of each year a certificate from a licensed veterinary, stating that their cattle have been inspected and tested and found to be free from tuberculosis. Under penalty of having their license revoked and a fine not to exceed one dollar."
