EX-SERVICE MEN GIVEN NOTICE BY D. P. SNYDER

Ex-service men in Allegany County are warned by County Clerk Snyder that if they wish to take advantage of the Act of July 19, 1919, as regards naturalization of World War Veterans, must do so before March 3rd, 1924.

The above mentioned act was passed so as to put in motion an expeditious proceeding for the naturalization or honorably discharged aliens who served in the military or naval forces of the United States during the World War.

A provision in the act continued its benefits in force only for one year after the return of the troops to the United States. As the last American troops were returned home March 3, 1923, the benefits of the act will cease Monday, March 3, 1924, and after this date all aliens mentioned not availing themselves of this opportunity will necessarily have to comply with the usual requirements of naturalization.

Ex-service men desiring to avail themselves are requested to get in touch with County Clerk Snyder who in turn will get in touch with the nearest Naturalization Examiner so that the necessary arrangements may be made for that purpose.






