Robert E. Pierce, a life long and respected resident of Cuba died Feb. 18. Deceased was 56 years of age and is survived by his wife and two children.

Mrs. Alex Lytle died Feb. 15th at her home in Angelica where she was born May, 21, 1849. Her husband and seven children survive.
