### FIVE DAY SCHOOL A SUCCESS

The Five Day School for Bible School Workers which was held in Wellsville last week was the largest of the kind that has been held in any county of the state, either last year or this, we are told by the teaching staff who recently held similar schools in Rochester and Dunkirk. The Allegany County school had a paid registration of one hundred and twenty-two, and was a very successful school, not only from the point of view of numbers, but also in regularity of attendance, inspiration for the new program of religious education which it emphasized and the quality of work done by the large number of credit students.

The faculty consisted of Dr. T. Basil Young, Dr. Joseph Clarke and Fred D. Cartwright of the New York State Sunday School Association, and Rev. John Calvin, Mrs. Guy Sharp and Miss Edith Cummings of Buffalo.

They gave courses in "Home Religious Instruction," "Religious Psychology," "The Influence of the Bible on Civilization," "Story Telling," "Hard Work" and "The Teaching Values of the Life of Christ," besides specialization courses in department methods.
