STATE DRY BILL NOT PARTY MEASURE

Machold So Announces as Party Council is Being Held Today.

Albany, March 19.—The Jenks bill, calling for the restoration of a state-wide prohibition enforcement act, had a public hearing in the assembly here yesterday.

The bill is the one drafted by the District Attorneys' Association.

A conference of Republican members of the lower house on the Jenks bill is being held today and the whole subject of dry-law enforcement is being thoroughly discussed.

Proponents of the Jenks measure are optimistic. They believe they will be able to muster the required seventy-six votes out of the majority of eighty-seven Republican members. Capitol observers predict the prohibition enforcement issue, which recently leaped into the spotlight, may supply a big surprise.

Speaker Machold said today he will not endeavor to make the measure a party bill.
