

VILLAGE ORDINANCE

Passed March 24, 1924. Repealed March 26, 1924.

An ordinance establishing a residential zoning district on certain portions thereof, in the Village of Andover, N. Y., and providing the construction of certain buildings therein.

It is hereby ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover, N. Y., in regular session assembled, as follows:

Section 1. That that portion of Greenwood Street, in the Village of Andover, N. Y., known as West Greenwood Street, and that portion thereof known as East Greenwood Street are hereby fixed, determined and established as a residential district zone of said Village, within the limits and distances hereinafter stated, and that no person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall be allowed to construct or rebuild any building or structure of any kind on either side of said Street or portions thereof, within 75 feet of the center of said Street or portions thereof, for the purpose of trade, commerce, manufacture, or for any purpose other than for residential purposes and for the express purpose of being used as a residence for one or more private families, except by and with the consent and approval of the Board of Trustees of said Village, except that this ordinance shall not apply to that portion of East Greenwood Street or West Greenwood Street which is within the limit of 200 feet from the center of Main Street in said Village, which is hereby declared to be a portion of the business section of said Village and entitled to be used for business, trade or commerce.

Section 2. That Chestnut Street in said Village is hereby fixed, determined and established as a residential district zone of said Village, within the limits and distances hereinafter stated, and that no person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall be allowed to construct or rebuild any building or structure of any kind on either side of said Street or portions thereof, within 75 feet of the center of said Street or portions thereof, for the purpose of trade, commerce, manufacture, or for any purpose other than for residential purposes and for the express purpose of being used as a residence for one or more private families, except by and with the consent and approval of the Board of Trustees of said Village.

Section 3. That that portion of Center Street in said Village is hereby fixed, determined and established as a residential district zone of said Village, within the limits and distances hereinafter stated, and that no person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall be allowed to construct or rebuild any building or structure of any kind on either side of said Street or portions thereof, within 75 feet of the center of said Street or portions thereof, for the purpose of trade, commerce, manufacture, or for any purpose other than for residential purposes and for the express purpose of being used as a residence for one or more private families, except by and with the consent and approval of the Board of Trustees of said Village, except that this ordinance shall not apply to that portion of East Center Street which is within the limit of 150 feet from the center of Main Street in said Village, which is hereby declared to be a portion of the business section of said Village and entitled to be used for business, trade or commerce.

Section 4. That Church Street in said Village is hereby fixed, determined and established as a residential district zone of said Village, within the limits and distances hereinafter stated, and that no person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall be allowed to construct or rebuild any building or structure of any kind on either side of said Street within 75 feet of the center of said Street, for the purpose of trade, commerce, manufacture, or for any purpose other than for residential purposes and for the express purpose of being used as a residence for one or more private families, except by and with the consent and approval of the Board of Trustees of said Village.

Section 5. That Elm Street in said Village is hereby fixed, determined and established as a residential district zone of said Village, within the limits and distances hereinafter stated, and that no person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall be allowed to construct or rebuild any building or structure of any kind on either side of said Street within 75 feet of the center of said Street, for the purpose of trade, commerce, manufacture, or for any purpose other than for residential purposes and for the express purpose of being used as a residence for one or more private families, except by and with the consent and approval of the Board of Trustees of said Village, except that this ordinance shall not apply to that portion of Elm Street which is within the limit of 140 feet from the center of Main Street in said Village, which is hereby declared to be a portion of the business section of said Village and entitled to be used for business, trade or commerce.

Section 6. That East Avenue in said Village is hereby fixed, determined and established as a residential district zone of said Village, within the limits and distances hereinafter stated, and that no person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall be allowed to construct or rebuild any building or structure of any kind on either side of said Avenue within 75 feet of the center of said Avenue, for the purpose of

trade, commerce, manufacture, or for any purpose other than for residential purposes and for the express purpose of being used as a residence for one or more private families, except by and with the consent and approval of the Board of Trustees of said Village.

Section 7. That First Street in said Village is hereby fixed, determined and established as a residential district zone of said Village, within the limits and distances hereinafter stated, and that no person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall be allowed to construct or rebuild any building or structure of any kind on either side of said Street, for the purpose of trade, commerce, manufacture, or for any purpose other than for residential purposes and for the express purpose of being used as a residence for one or more private families, except by and with the consent and approval of the Board of Trustees of said Village.

Section 8. That Dyke Street in said Village is hereby fixed, determined and established as a residential district zone of said Village, within the limits and distances hereinafter stated, and that no person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall be allowed to construct or rebuild any building or structure of any kind on either side of said Street within 75 feet of the center of said Street, for the purpose of trade, commerce, manufacture, or for any purpose other than for residential purposes and for the express purpose of being used as a residence for one or more private families, except by and with the consent and approval of the Board of Trustees of said Village.

Section 9. That Second Street in

said Village is hereby fixed, determined and established as a residential district zone of said Village, within the limits and distances hereinafter stated, and that no person or persons, corporation or corporations, shall be allowed to construct or rebuild any building or structure of any kind on either side of said Street, for the purpose of trade, commerce, manufacture, or for any purpose other than for residential purposes and for the express purpose of being used as a residence for one or more private families, except by and with the consent and approval of the Board of Trustees of said Village.

Any person, firm or corporation, violating this ordinance, or any of its requirements, shall be liable to a penalty or forfeiture of One Hundred Dollars, to be sued for and recovered in the name of the Village in a civil action.

Any person, firm or corporation upon whom the court shall impose a penalty for the violation of the foregoing ordinance shall immediately efface, tear down and remove the structure so erected in violation of said ordinance, or in default thereof shall be liable to and forfeit a further penalty of ten dollars for each and every day the said structure is left standing, after the said penalty has been imposed by the said court.
