Ordinances and By-Laws of the Village of Andover, Adopted Nov. 25, 1892 With Amendments and Additions to July 1, 1911.

ARTICLE VI

Streets and Sidewalks

Section I. Encumbering Streets and Sidewalks: Any person who and Sidewalks: Any persen who shall throw place or deposit, or permit to remain, in any public street, highway, lane, park or public ground, or on any sidewalk or cross-wath in this Village any stones before the public treet. brick, wood, lumber, wagon or officer vehicle, dirt, ashes, paper, rubbish, fith or any other material, article or thing whatever, or in any manner or thing whatever, or in any manner encumber, obstruct or enroach upon the saine, except as hereinafter provided, shall upon coaviction forfeit not less than one nor more than twenty-five dollars and cost and five dollars and costs for each day nuch material, article, encumbrance, obstruction or enroachment shall so remain after verbal notice from the Street Commissioner, President or any Trustee to remove saine. Thus section is subject to laws regulating the encumbering of streets when erecting or repairing buildings and the preformance of other necessary work.
