# Farm and Stock Mart

Washington, D. C., For the week ending, April 7, 1924

#### Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices range from 10-20c lower than a week ago, closing at \$7.60 for the top and \$7.50-\$7.60 for the bulk. Medium and good beef steers five cents lower to 15c higher at \$8.25-11.85; butcher cows and heifers 10c lower to 25c higher at \$4-10.75; feeder steers steady to 25c higher at \$5.25-8.75 and light and medium weight veal calves 25-50c higher at \$8.25-11.75; fat lambs steady to 10c higher at \$14.75-16.85; feeding lambs 25c lower to 25c higher at \$14.25-15.50; yearlings steady at \$12-15 and fat ewes higher at \$7.75-12. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending March 28 were: Cattle and calves 36,862; hogs 9,076; sheep 16,179. In eastern wholesale fresh meat markets veal is weak to \$1 lower; lamb firm to \$2 higher; mutton firm to \$3 higher and pork lions \$1.35 up. April 7 prices good grade meats: Beef \$15-16; veal \$17-20; lamb \$26-30; mutton \$20-23; light pork lions \$17-21; heavy lions \$13.50-17.

#### Fruits and Vegetables

Eastern potato markets generally steady to firm. New York round whites closed at \$1.60-1.85 sacked per 100 pounds in eastern cities. Maine sacked green mountains unchanged at \$2-2.20 in New York and \$1.90-1.95 in Boston. Northern sacked round whites slightly weaker in Chicago at \$1.20-1.40; firm at \$1.10-1.25 at shipping points. Florida pointed type cabbage steady to stronger, ranging \$1.75-2.25 per 1 1/2 bushel hamper. Texas flat and round types advanced \$5-15 closing at \$60-75 bulk per ton in city wholesale markets; firm at shipping points at \$27-30. Yellow onions irregular at \$1.50-2.25 sacked per 100 pounds leading markets, top of \$2.50 in Chicago. Louisiana strawberries Klondikes weak at \$6-6.50 per 24 pint crate in Chicago. Georgia extra fancy asparagus \$8.50-9 per crate in

Cincinnati. Eastern apples generally steady to firm. New York Baldwin sold at \$3-3.75 per barrel. In eastern cities, top of \$4.50 in Boston and Cincinnati. Northwestern extra fancy Winesaps steady at \$2-\$2.50 per box, leading markets.

#### Hay

Hay market fairly firm for top grades, lower grades continue dull. Demand of only moderate volume. Bad roads restrictive movement of hay in central west. Alfalfa in better demand at firmer prices at Kansas City and Omaha. New alfalfa from Imperial Valley, California selling in Los Angeles \$25-27 per ton. Stock Yards good buying of prairie. Quoted April 5: No. 1 timothy: Boston \$28.50, New York \$29.50, Phila. \$28, Pittsburgh \$27, Cincinnati \$24.50, Chicago \$27, Minneapolis \$18.50, St. Louis \$28.50, No. 1 alfalfa: Kansas City \$27.50, Omaha \$20.50, Minneapolis 22. No.

1 prairie: Kansas City \$15.50, Omaha \$13.50, Minneapolis \$15.50.

#### Feed

Most feedstuffs in excellent supply. Oil meals especially linseed meal heavy. Minneapolis quoted 84 per cent. linseed meal at around \$37 while Buffalo resellers ask about \$38 f.o.b. that market. Good demand for gluten feed since recent cut in price of \$4 per ton.

#### Grain

Grain future markets dull and lack buying support. Prices trend downward. Cash grain receipts light but prices slightly lower than at close of previous week. Choice milling wheat in good demand, low grades dull. Good demand for corn and oats at the lower quotations. Quoted April 7: No. 1 dark northern spring, Minneapolis \$1.12-\$1.27. No. 2 hard winter Chicago \$1.03 1/2-1.06 1/2; Kansas City \$1.12; St. Louis \$1.03. No. 2 red

#### Dairy Products

Butter markets unsettled during the week and irregular at the close with the tone barely steady to weak. Speculative support which developed was not permanent. Foreign butter still an influence. The expected large shipment from New Zealand has arrived. Closing prices on 92 score butter today: New York 40 1/2c. Phila. 41c; Chicago 38 1/2c; Boston 42c. Cheese markets weak and dull. Dealers nervous and anxious to keep receipts moving. Lower prices not considered unlikely. Wholesale prices at Wisconsin primary markets April 5: Single Daisies 18 1/2c; Long-horns and Square Prints 18c.

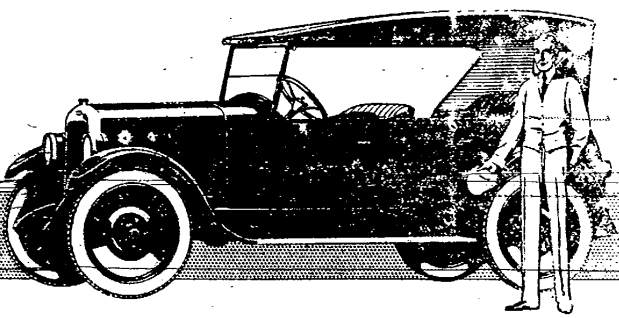
