MORE CORPORATIONS ARE INCORPORATED

Over Five Thousand Companies Chartered in Last Three Months.

Albany, April 9.—Under the sunshine of prosperity, the business world is blossoming forth this spring with greater indications of a golden harvest than in many a year. Over 300 more companies incorporated in New York State during the last three months than in the same period a year ago. Comparative records in the corporation bureau of Secretary of State Hamilton's office show a total of 5,683 newly chartered companies this year as against 5,376 in the first three months of 1923.

Taking it for granted that there will always be mice, one concern incorporated last month to turn out mouse traps, another will breed cats, while a third will produce a mayonaisse dressing and a fourth will supply wooden heels.

Out of the 1,920 new companies last month, 650 will engage in real estate, 23 will supply entertainment in motion pictures, and 59 seek to comply with Dame Fashion's demands while 60 companies will add their share to the hundreds of thousands of automobiles already on the highways.
