PRESBYTERY OF STEUBEN MEETS

Successful Meeting Was Held at Bath Monday and Tuesday.

Bath, April 22.—The spring meeting of the Presbytery of Steuben, which includes Steuben and Allegany counties, was held here Monday evening and today, approximately fifty clergymen and lay delegates being present. Rev. U. L. Mackey of the Synod of New York, gave an address at the Monday evening session on "The Presbyterian Church and National Missions." At the business meeting today Rev. George L. Toppen, of Hammondsport, was elected moderator, and Rev. A. S. Jones, of Avoca, clerk. The following committees were appointed: Bills and overtures, Rev. E. Grosh, Campbell; Rev. Philip Schwartz, Jasper; Mr. Little, Addison; judicial review, Rev. W. McCall, Hornell; Rev. John Knox, Painted Post; Mr. Jeffreys, Canisteo; leave of absence, Rev. T. M. Talmadge, Hornell; G. H. Bellinger, of Avoca; sessional records, Rev. R. E. MacGowan, Andover; resolutions, Rev. Robert E. Finley, Cuba; nominating committee, Rev. Albert Schofield, Pultney; Rev. William Hawthorne and L. R. Hopkins, of Prattsburgh. Rev. J. V. Axtell, of Addison, was chosen as the commission-

er to the general assembly with Rev. T. M. Talmadge, of Hornell, alternate. Dr. Proctor, of Canastota, and Edwin S. Brown, of Canastota, were elected elders. Rev. C. C. Plumb was made provisional moderator. At Almond, G. A. Newling, a student at the Auburn Theological seminary, was licensed by the Presbytery. The fall meeting of the Presbytery will probably be held at Belmont, although as yet not definitely decided.

The Allegany County Bible School Association holds its annual spring convention in Angelica, next Monday and Tuesday, April 28 and 29. The program is a strong one with a popular appeal, emphasizing the new program of religious education which is common to all protestant denominations and which is being received with increasing favor.

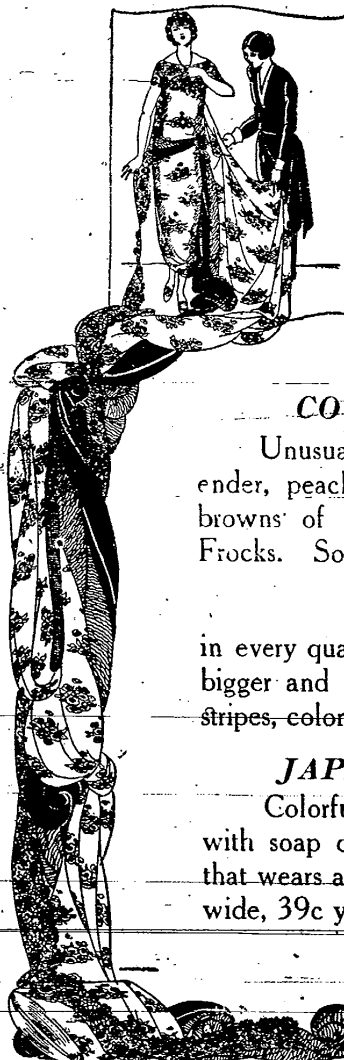
In the evening, the Sunday School gave a program of Easter music and exercises.
