FOUR CHEST CLINICS HELD

Four chest consultant clinics were held in the county from April 15th to 19th, by the New York State Department of Health. Dr. Jonathan Pearson, Director of the Division of Tuberculosis and Dr. Lyman Thayer were in charge, assisted by Miss M. M. Washburn, R. N. State Health Dept., Miss Frances Kernser, R. N. District Supervisor Nurse, Miss Teresa C. Bumpster County Nurse, Miss M. Elizabeth Smith, R. N. and Miss J. J. Cashion, radiographer.

Patients were sent to the clinics by physicians and health officers of the county. Each patient was examined and X-rayed and reports of these examinations have been sent to the physicians. At Wellsville, twenty-seven patients were examined; at Andover twenty-nine and at Cuba twenty. Dr. J. J. Mahoney, District State Health Officer was present. Eight patients came to Fillmore on April 18th when several roads were impassable on account of floods.

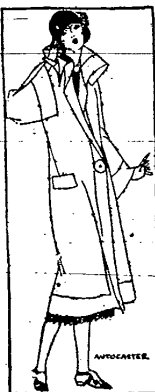
