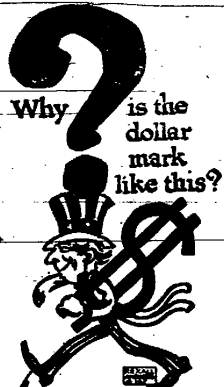

of the Clerk of the Town of Andover, Robert Brundage, Andover, N. Y. Each Proposal must be submitted in a separate sealed envelope, and should be made on proposal blanks furnished by the Town Clerk. Each proposal must be accompanied by cash, draft or certified check payable to the order of the Supervisor of the Town of Andover, for an amount equal to at least ten per cent of the amount of the proposal or bid, as a guarantee to the Town Board that the party will enter into a contract for the work at the price named in the proposal providing that the Town Board determines that he is the lowest responsible bidder, and should the party fail to enter into such contract, then the check shall be forfeited to the town and the proceeds from such check shall be credited to the fund available for such work. All such checks shall be returned to the proper parties when contract is awarded. The party to whom such contract is awarded will be required to execute a bond to the town in a sum equal to one-half of the amount of the contract with such surety as may be approved by the Town Board.
