**June Milk Prices**

Producers' prices for June milk, as recommended by the Board of Directors of the Dairymen's League Co-operative Association, Inc., are as follows:

Class 1 (fluid milk) \$1.86.  
Class 2-A (cream) \$1.70, plus skim milk value.  
Class 2-B (plain condensed and ice cream) \$1.85.  
Class 2-C (soft cheese) \$1.85.  
Class 3 (evaporated, sweetened, condensed and milk powder and hard cheeses, other than American) \$1.55.  
Class 4-A (butter) same as usual.  
Class 4-B (American cheese) same as usual.

These prices are for 100 pounds of 3 per cent. milk at the 201-210 mile zone, with the usual differentials for freight, butterfat and quality.
