## Grand Jury Did Not Indict

The Steuben county grand jury which was in session at Hornell this week rose Tuesday afternoon with 18 sealed and 3 open indictments. No indictment was found against Miss Augusta Knapp, teacher of the district No. 1, town of West Union, for an alleged severe whipping with a leather strap of Howard Johnson, the 12 years old son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Johnson, for talking out loud in school contrary to the rules. The case was presented as the result of the action and arrest of Miss Knapp and the grand jury after an alleged long heated consideration of the evidence voted not to indict.

Miss Knapp has been hired to teach the school another year.

## Veterans' Letters

## Won't Be Answered

Major General Robert C. Davis, adjutant general of the war department, has sent the following information relative to adjusted compensation.

It is not necessary to write to the war department, the navy department, or the United States Veterans' Bureau, for blank form for adjusted compensation or for any information concerning it. Full information with regard thereto will be published in the public press and detailed information will be contained in the circular that will accompany each application. When the blank forms of application and the circulars have been printed, they will be immediately distributed throughout the country to the post offices, to the posts of the American Legion and other veteran organizations, to the American Red Cross Chapters and to the army and navy recruiting offices and army and navy posts and stations, for immediate delivery to all persons who desire to apply for adjusted compensation. It is expected that copies of application and circulars of instructions will be available for distribution on or before June 30, 1924.

Cash payment of the adjusted compensation to those entitled to \$50 or less will not be made prior to March 1, 1925. The adjusted service certificates will bear date January 1, 1925, or later, but under the law, no loan can be made on the adjusted service certificates until two years after the date of such certificates.

The war department, navy department, and the United States Veterans' Bureau, have made extensive preparations to handle promptly all claims for the adjusted compensation. This great work will require the undivided work of every employee, and it will be impossible to answer individual inquiries con-
