Counting in the marks given in

writing, which are not listed above,

122 preliminary papers were passed

out of 127 written, for a percentage

of 96. In the academic depart-

ment, out of 234 papers written,

187 were rated by the teachers at

65% or more, giving the school a

percentage of 80.

are entitled to their preliminary
