He would have spells of melancholia lasting over a week at times and lately has been growing worse. The past week he shut himself in his room, imagining that he was in the army and would wear his gas mask for hours at a time or do the manual of arms with a loaded shotgun or imagine that he was standing guard.

Harold Saunders, Post Commander of the American Legion, and Wm. Goerner, Adjutant, of Belfast went to his home Monday. He was standing guard at the head of the stairs, with a loaded shotgun and threatened to shoot Mr. Saunders, but after he had spoken to him, Hartman seemed to recognize him and gave up the gun. He was then taken to the Wellsville hospital where he will stay until arrangements can be made by the Legion to secure treatment for him in a government hospital.

"Fog" was a fine young man, a good ball player and one who loved the game, but this year he has only played in two games, his teammates being unable to persuade him to join them.

His many friends thruout this vicinity will be sorry to learn of his condition and trust that he may be given such treatment that he will recover. The American Legion will do all in their power to see that he gets the treatment he deserves. Rushford Spectator.
